

CLINTON A. ADAMS

Clinton A. Adams was born in Randolph, Vermont, May 23. 1860. He died in Post Mills on July 23, 1942, and his body was buried in Post Mills cemetery on July 26; but who can say that through his influence helping to form the character of many thousands of lives with whom he had come in contact, directly or indirectly. in the church, in the town, state, nation and indeed throughout the world, that he is not still living among us and that this influence shall not continue os long as time shall continue.

His parents, Bailey Adams and Lucinda Bullard Adams were among the early settlers of the state. He was educated in

the public schools and at Randolph Normal School.

Early in life he migrated to Chatsworth, Ill., where he was engaged in the lumber business with his uncle for several years. Following this he came to Post Mills and entered the employ of the T. H. Chubb Company as a part of the office force. On February 23, 1886, he was married to Phoeba Chubb, his employer's daughter, who died in 1925. Leaving the Rod Company he purchased the Post Mills General Store which he successfully conducted until 1902. Since 1902 he has been a small farmer and given his time largely to public duties. He has been school director, selectman for 25 years, moderator 14 years, served in both branches of the legislature and as assistant judge in Orange County Court. He was also director of the National Bank of Orange County. Early in life he joined the Post Mills Congregational Church of which he was deacon, clerk and a member of the parish committee for many years until the time of his death. He was Past Master of Jackson Lodge No. 60 A. F. & A. M. and was always interested in fraternal work.

He settled many estates in this vicinity and held many positions of trust and responsibility. He was also Postmaster

for many years.

On January 22, 1925, he was married to Miss Ellen M. Mead of Northfield who still survives him. He is also survived by two children, Isabel Adams Condict, who has been a missionary to Burma, and Albert C. Adams of Neshanic, N. J.; also, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Mr. Adams was always interested in all public improvements and ready to assist to the extent of his ability. He was confidant and advisor to a host of people. Literally "he lived in a house by the side of the road and was a friend of man."

A GLIMPSE OF ACADEMY HISTORY

The founding of Thetford Academy occurred at the logical time for such an event.

At the beginning of the century the nation was just beginning to find itself, and soon the war of 1812, while disastrous in many ways, greatly stimulated business. In Thetford the abundant water power was being developed and thriving country stores were in operation. While bartering was still resorted to, money was more plentiful and there was a growing desire for the good things of life.

Vermont had from the beginning encouraged the common school and the college but there was a gap between the two. In 1780, only three years after its independence, the little republic had chartered its first academy at Bennington, and by 1818 twenty-eight such schools had sprung up. All that seemed to be needed was the desire, and men to accomplish it.

Thetford had both these factors. The desire had apparently been present for some years but obstacles had existed. Finally some kind of an organization was effected, the details of which are now unknown as the secretary's records were burned in 1843. Trustees were elected, land and material given and the old Academy building which was burned on last November 14th, was erected in 1818.

There was no other building until 1845, when the first dormitory was built. The families of the Hill seemed to take pride in caring for those students who came from outside. The old building remained substantially the same through all the years. Old pictures show that there was originally a half-circle fan in the front gable where, in later years, there were windows, and there was a fence in front of the building. In 1903 the building was raised a few feet to give room for a higher basement, but the outlines remained the same.

The main purpose of the school seems to have been to prepare young men for college, which made a classical course necessary. Admission to college called for Latin, Greek and mathematics. Colleges for women were unknown although they were doubtless dreamed of. But young women were admitted from the first to the school and for them there were special provisions. Some kind of an auxiliary, called the Education Society, was formed and it is significant that there is no record of aid to young women. It was all for young men who would enter the professions.

The Academy was founded by Thetford men but the basic background appears to have been the church rather than the town. All the men named in the charter were connected with the Hill church which was, up to that time, the only one in town. There was therefore no connection with the town as a political unit except by sentiment. In recent years, however, a stronger bond has existed. The town now is represented on the Board of Trustees and it contributes generously to the support of the school.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THETFORD SCHOOL BOARD

By strictest economy, much of it made necessary by war conditions, the School Board are pleased to report a very gratifying financial condition of the School District.

We were unable to secure the services of a Superintendent of music and art. Desirable equipment could not be obtained, and only the most necessary repairs have been made. The extensive grading of the Post Mills School grounds were made without expense to the town. A great saving in fuel has been made by use of bobbin wood from the mill sold to the town at a reduced rate and some of it without charge.

The co-operation of the citizens of the town has been extensive and of great assistance.

What the next year holds in store for us no one can predict. The difficulty in obtaining qualified teachers and fuel may be considerable. We promise our most earnest efforts and ask your indulgence and continued co-operation.

If things go to your satisfaction tell the teacher if not take it up with the superintendent as he is responsible for the conduct of the schools.

Some schools may have to be closed and the children transported to nearby schools. It has been suggested that it might be well to start the schools as early as possible and continue later in the season. This would enable us to have a longer vacation during the coldest part of the winter and we believe it would be to the advantage of the pupils. On this matter we would like to have the sentiment of the town. This would simplify transportation and might be of great help to pupils living at a distance.

We recommend that a tax of \$1.75 which would be the same as last year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To Citizens of the Town of Thetford:

I herewith submit my third annual report.

Improvement of Instruction.

The improvement of classroom instruction is recognized as the most important function of supervision. Consequently the major portion of my time is devoted to this phase of the work. During the year 1942 I have visited each school in Thetford an average of 16.7 times. Visits have also been made by Mrs. Margaret Kelley, State Helping Teacher and by Mr. Carl Batchelder, Deputy Commissioner of Education. Four teachers' meetings have been held including one all day meeting to take the place of the annual teachers' convention.

Standard achievement tests show that satisfactory progress in all subjects is being made. Most encouraging results are in reading and arithmetic. Another year will show, I believe, more satisfactory improvement in English and spelling. Increased emphasis is also given to instruction in science. The new Course of Study in Science has been carefully discussed with the teachers and some standard reference material in this field has been provided for each school.

Each teacher deserves commendation for carrying on the work in music and art. However, a decrease in interest in both subjects has resulted in most schools since we have lost the services of our music and art teacher. It should be explained that present conditions have made it not only inadvisable but quite impossible to find anyone to take the position.

Buildings and Grounds.

No major changes or improvements in any of the buildings have been made during the past year. Minor repairs have been made where necessary. In general, all buildings are in good repair and satisfactory in appearance.

The school grounds at Post Mills have been improved by grading. Playground equipment should be added as soon as possible. Because many types of playground equipment are now virtually impossible to obtain our present equipment should have even better care than usual and repairs should be made promptly when needed.

The Schools' Part in the War.

Complete willingness to accept inconvenience, to make sacrifices and to work unceasingly for victory have been characteristic of all schools. Thetford schools have made enviable records when compared with others. In the Orange East District the scrap drive netted about 223 tons of metal. Of this total one school in Thetford contributed about 30 tons. Likewise, one small school in Thetford has bought almost one-fifth of all stamps and bonds sold through the schools of this district.

The work of the teachers in the rationing program, in first-aid classes, on airplane observation posts, in Red Cross work and in many other ways has been an indispensable part of the work of a nation at war.

The fundamental contribution of the schools to the general welfare is, however, to inform, educate and train children. Going to school is the child's job just as making machines, growing food or carrying a gun is an adult's job. The child's best contribution is in preparing to meet future responsibilities—not only in winning the war but also in helping to solve intelligently the problems of postwar reconstruction.

The Shortage of Teachers.

The primary factor contributing to teacher shortage in all rural areas is economic. An inexperienced stenographer with no more than a high school education can go to work in a government office at a beginning salary of \$1440. Women workers in war industries are making as much as \$60 per week. It is not surprising that thousands of experienced teachers are giving up school work for other types of employment.

A genuine appreciation of the faithfulness of our own teachers in this emergency should be shown. A determined, intelligent desire to serve that community and their country keeps many of them with us when shorter hours and higher pay beckon elsewhere.

The State Department of Education is making every effort to meet the teacher shortage by every means in its power. The program of the normal schools has been accelerated. Constant efforts are being made to interest high school graduates in teaching as a career. A large number of emergency certificates have been issued to former teachers and other qualified persons. These temporary measures are succeeding, for the

present, in keeping the schools running. But in spite of these measures the problem becomes increasingly more acute. Obtaining teachers for all schools next year may prove to be impossible.

State Aid.

Last year the state treasurer forwarded to the Thetford town treasurer a total of \$4,306.12 on the "equated pupil" basis. This is calculated on the number of schools and on the average daily attendance. State aid is intended to help equalize the tax burden and the educational opportunities between the rural towns and industrial and richer centers.

With the movement of many families away from the rural towns and the consequent decrease in attendance at rural schools the amount of state aid will decrease for towns like Thetford while it will tend to increase for industrial towns. I sincerely hope, therefore, that further equalization may be brought about by amendment of Section 4338 of the Public Laws to increase the rate of state aid as calculated on the equated pupil basis. It is a duty of every citizen to study this problem.

Planning for the Future.

We may safely assume that the years ahead will bring severe changes and economic readjustments. It would seem wise, therefore, to pay off our school debt as rapidly as possible so that we may meet the future without a serious handicap.

How to keep the gains we have made and how to make our schools even better should concern us all. Rural education must not suffer inattention and neglect. This is equally a problem of the town, the state and the nation.

Conclusion.

Again I wish to express appreciation of the helpful cooperation of school directors, teachers and parents in the work of maintaining the highest possible standards in all of our schools.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THETFORD ACADEMY

To the People of Thetford:

It seems a long time since that quiet and peaceful morning of September 7, 1943 when 108 students responded to the tolling of the Academy bell beginning the 123rd year of Thetford Academy's existence. It seems a long time since that bell rang out over the village every forty minutes to announce the changing of classes in the old Academy. It seems a long time since the students and faculty were busy harvesting and canning and the buildings were being prepared for the winter months. Yet by the calendar it is only two short months since the destruction by fire of the property of Mr. and Mrs. Cekich, the Latham Memorial Library, and two of the Academy buildings—the original Academy building and Burton Hall.

However, throughout the chaos of these last months there shines a beacon—the faithfulness, friendliness, cooperation, and loyalty of the people of Thetford. These were demonstrated the night of the fire and the following days. No principal could be prouder than I of the loyalty and cooperation that the students showed during the week school was not in session when they eagerly undertook every task within their powers, accepting the loss as their personal tragedy and the readjustment as their particular problem.

Surely we cannot let that spirit die. It is the duty, it is the responsibility of the trustees, the alumni and friends to justify that spirit by a stronger and better Academy.

May I publicly acknowledge my gratefulness to the many individuals who have helped during this trying time,—to the people who have given their trucks, their time, their money, and their advice,—to the various organizations and to the people who have contributed books, clothing, canned

goods and produce,—to the Home Guard, who carried on during the night of November 14th, and to the Red Cross, which purchased clothing, bedding and textbooks,—all of which have helped to enable us to carry on the work of the Academy.

I hope, when the time comes for the rebuilding of Thetford Academy, that not only the people as individuals but people as a town will feel that the school serves them and their children well and so will contribute to its continuance.

As Thetford Academy has served the past so may it continue to serve the future generations.

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE DEPARTMENT STATE HOUSE MONTPELIER, VERMONT

For the information of your taxpayers, the customary annual statement is presented for your town report.

Payments of Old Age Assistance to persons applying from your town amounted to \$4,786.50 during the year January 1, 1942 to December 31, 1942.

The number of recipients in December, 1942 was 24.

As this program touches every community and many persons, we believe the public should know the following facts:

The increase in the cost of food, fuel, rents and services constitutes a serious problem to persons dependent on small fixed allowances and has been the cause of much concern to the Old Age Assistance Department which is responsible for the welfare of about 5,400 aged individuals now receiving assistance. In addition, there are some 500 eligible applicants who cannot yet be helped because sufficient state funds are not available.

The resources of this department and its ability to make grants are determined by the state appropriation which is matched by federal funds. The Legislature, conscious of the needs of the aged citizens of the state, has frequently given favorable consideration to this problem. The expenses of administering the program have been the lowest of any state in the Union on a comparable basis.

The advice and council of local officials and interested persons have been very valuable and are gratefully acknowledged

- Art. 13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the George Chamberlin legacy.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to sell and convey all the right, title and interest of the town in the brick school house in the Judd District, formerly known as District No. 11, together with land on which it stands and to appoint an agent to convey the same.
- Art. 15. To transact any other business that may legally and properly come before said meeting.
