

The legal Voters of the Town of Thetford in the County of Orange, and State of Vermont are hereby warned to meet in Anderson Hall, Thetford Academy, in the Town of Thetford on Tuesday, March 3, 1981 at 10:00 A.M. to transact the following business:

Article I. To elect the Town and School Officers for the ensuing year. (Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.)

By Petition

Article II. Shall the Town and Town School District vote to start its Annual Town and Town School District Meeting at 7:30 P.M. O'clock on the Monday preceding the first Tuesday of March and transact at that time any business not involving voting by Australian Ballot or voting required by law to be by ballot and to be held on the first Tuesday in March. (Upon consideration of this article, if so requested by seven voters, voting on this article will be by paper ballot and the polls will be open until 7:00 P.M.)

Article III. To hear and act upon the reports of the Town Officers.

Article IV. To hear and act upon Part I of the Budget Committee Report in regard to recommended expenditures for anticipated Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$30,000.00.

Article V. To hear and act upon Part II of the Budget Committee Report and raise \$134,330.00 for the Highway Budget and \$61,355.00 for the Town General Account. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 21, 1981 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty.

Article VI. To hear and act upon Part III of the Budget Committee Report and raise \$882,743.11 for the School District. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 21, 1981 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty.

Article VII. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$2,400. to install sodium-vapor lamps in the Thetford Elementary School Gymnasium. (The payback period on this expenditure is estimated to be 2 1/2 years.)

Article VIII. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$1,000. to install insulation behind the flush mounted tables in the Thetford Elementary School Gymnasium and also into metal window wall panels in the classrooms of the original elementary school building. (The payback period on this expenditure is estimated to be five years.)

Article IX. To see if the voters will vote \$1,850.00 to Orange County Mental Health Service, Inc. (\$1,676.40 was voted in 1980, requested \$3,285.00 for 1981.)

Article X. To see if the voters will vote \$3,504.00 to Community Health Services, Inc. at \$1.60 per capita. (\$2,844 was voted in 1980 and 1979 at \$2 per capita.)

Article XI. By Petition

To see if the voters will appropriate \$4 per capita (\$8,760.) to the Thetford Library Federation. This is the same amount per capita that has been requested for the past two years.

Article XII. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$500.00 for the White River Council on Aging. (\$500 was voted in 1980)

Article XIII. To see if the voters wish to authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to \$75,000.00, not to exceed an eight year period, for purchase of a Pumper truck for the Thetford Volunteer Fire Dept.

Article XIV. By Petition

To see if the voters wish to have the Selectmen's Budget and the School Directors Budget on the Town and School District Warnings be voted on by paper ballot.

Article XV. Referendum by Petition

Shall the Town of Thetford direct the Representative from District Number Orange - 3 and the Senator from Orange County to introduce resolutions in the Vermont State House of Representatives and Senate to:

- (1) Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union a mutual nuclear weapons moratorium by which the United States and the Soviet Union agree to halt immediately the testing, production, and deployment of all nuclear warheads, missiles, and delivery systems, and
 - (2) Request Congress to transfer the funds saved to civilian use.

Article XVI. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

THETFORD REFERENDUM ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

Article XV in the Thetford Town Warning is a referendum calling for the U.S. to propose to the U.S.S.R. that both countries agree to a freeze on nuclear weapons.

WHY A MORATORIUM? The first step in reversing the arms race is stopping it. A moratorium is an agreement to stop. Since both the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. have agreed, in SALT II negotiations, that their nuclear forces are roughly equal, a moratorium won't put either country at a disadvantage. Once a freeze is in effect, there can be agreement on mutual steps toward total nuclear disarmament.

WHAT'S WRONG WITH NUCLEAR WEAPONS? In 1980, 702 doctors and scientists wrote a letter to the leaders of the U.S. and U.S.S.R. which appeared in the N. Y. Times and stated that:

- 1. Nuclear war, even a "limited" one, would result in death, injury and disease on a scale that has no precedent in the history of human existence.
- 2. Medical "disaster planning" for a nuclear war is meaningless.
- 3. There is no effective civil defense.
- 4. Recovery from nuclear war would be impossible.
- 5. In sum, there can be no winners in a nuclear war. Worldwide fallout would contaminate much of the globe for generations and atmospheric effects would severely damage all living things.

WHAT ABOUT THE RUSSIANS AND OUR NATIONAL SECURITY? The U.S. has about 30,000 nuclear weapons and the U.S.S.R. has about 20,000. According to a Library of Congress study, a minimum, nuclear exchange would kill 20 million Americans and an all-out exchange would kill 145 million Americans. Because there is no defense against nuclear weapons, both the U.S. and the Soviet Union are less secure today than ever before.

WHAT GOOD WILL THIS REFERENDUM DO? There is no guarantee that the Russians would agree to a nuclear weapons freeze, but there are good indications that they might. We won't know until a moratorium is proposed. However, our government isn't likely to make such a proposal until there is sufficient public pressure. That pressure is coming. This referendum was passed by three counties in Massachusetts during last November's general election. Thetford voters now have a chance to continue this effort to make the world a safer place for future generations.

We report that in the year 1980, \$492.50 was spent on the care of the Town Cemeteries.


There has been top soil delivered to East Thetford Cemetery for 1981, to repair and fill in those graves that have sunk down and are not even with the rest of the cemetery.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Board of Selectmen meets weekly on Monday evenings at 7:00 p.m. in the Town Hall. Our meetings are open to the public and citizens are invited to attend and offer their suggestions and criticisms about town government. We can serve you best if you make your concerns known to us. Most of our work is the day to day solution of town problems.

In December of each year we draw up our budget for the following year. The 1981 budget requests an appropriation of \$12,000 to build a new town vault. We feel this is the year to build another vault because a new vault requires a year to settle after construction before being used and the present vault is already overcrowded. We are not buying a new truck this year, so the cost of this project will not increase the tax burden unduly.

The appropriation for supplies in the retreatment program has doubled over last year's request. It now costs \$10,000 in supplies per mile for retreatment. Inflation has caused us to fall behind in our retreatment program. We have been retreating approximately five miles of blacktop each year. This year we were able to retreat only three miles before we ran out of money. In 1981, and henceforth, we hope to retreat four miles of blacktop per year.

On our more heavily travelled gravel roads we are experimenting with surfacing with hard pac in hopes of building a more durable surface.

On Monday evening, February 23rd at 8:00 p.m., we will review our budget for all interested townspeople who wish to attend. On Sunday March 1st, we will be present to answer questions at the pre-town meeting at the Elementary School.

In 1978 the Town contracted to have tax maps of the town drawn up. These maps would enable the planning commission to plot the growth of the town and assess said growth's impact on town services. The maps would also aid in the fair assessment of taxes. In November, Land Inventory Systems, Inc. delivered the "final" maps which the selectmen rejected due to the numerous inaccuracies. The listers have spent December and January reviewing the maps, identifying and resolving as many errors as possible. It is our hope that Land Inventory Systems, Inc. will print corrected maps and deliver them to us before Town Meeting.

During the year it is frequently the selectmen's duty to appoint citizens to town and regional boards. We try to advertise openings and hope townspeople interested in serving will make themselves known to us. We thank all those who have given of their time this past year in service to Thetford.

They are due back to us, corrected, in February. We then have until April 1st to approve them. We URGE all property owners to come in and look at them to make sure your property is in right.



REPORT OF THE THETFORD PLANNING COMMISSION 1980

Besides our regular work with public hearings and subdivision and zoningdecisions, the Planning Board participated in a number of activities. Several members attended workshops and meetings concerned with local as well as regional and state planning.

We discussed and provided input into the proposed merger of several regional planning commissions (which did not materialize); we informed our State Senator of our stand on proposed changes in Vermont's Right-to-Know law (with success); starting in June, we took part in discussions and meetings concerning possible contamination of water supplies from our sanitary landfill (an issue which is still pending); we heard and discussed a proposal of Vt. Electric Cooperative for a possible hydroelectric power source from the Union Village Dam.

We started to look into the possibilities of changing regional planning commissions from Upper Valley/Lake Sunapee to Two Rivers; and we worked and discussed a proposed revision of the Vermont Planning and Development Act and provided the Committee of Natural Resources with our recommendations.

We plan to work on changes in our zoning by-laws in the coming year and I would like to take this opportunity to ask for your thoughts and ideas. You are always welcome to our meeting. I also would like to thank all the members of the Planning Board for their work and dedication during the last year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND ADMINISTRATION

Thetford Elementary school continues to provide a good basic education in a wholesome and happy environment. Over 230 youngsters enjoy daily instruction in our well-maintained facility.

A very solid staff works hard to maintain, the high standards the community has come to expect. This year one new teacher, Nicholas Wadleigh, serves on our staff. Mr. Wadleigh teaches a fifth-sixth combination and joins Peggy Joiner, Kindergarten; Laura DeGoosh and JoAnn Kruzshak, Ist grades; Pat Finn, 2nd grade; Betsp Draper, 2nd and 3rd combination; Cyrie Lange, 3rd grade; Ann Swanson, 4th grade; Bonnie Irwin, 4th and 5th grade combination; Helen Magoon and Mary Scattergood, 6th grades. Lester Lawrence provides physical education to all classes three times a week, and Pat Ackerman serves as librarian.

The school continues to provide a breakfast program and a hot lunch program. Both are firstrate programs under the outstanding direction of Priscilla Emerson.

Our arts program continues, led by Valerie Pilcher. Artists from a variety of fields in the arts visit the school throughout the year. In addition, approximately 100 youngsters receive Dalcroze music lessons and another 75 sing in the youth chorus.

The playground, constructed largely through volunteer effort, is one of the finest around. Through the efforts of Dave Norman, Rick Hoffman, and Lester Lawrence, a skating rink has been added this winter.

Two of our major efforts in improving the curriculum will be made in the areas of math and science. The staff has been divided into working groups to make some necessary changes in both of those areas.

In addition to serving school-age youngsters of Thetford, the Elementary School also provides space for a dozen groups of citizens who need a place to meet regularly and another fifteen groups who need meeting space on a less regular basis. The maximum use of the building to serve the community's needs is a policy the Board and administration support enthusiastically.


This year the School Board has placed two articles on the Warning dealing with energy conservation measures. These measures are part of an ongoing program at the school to implement the recommendation of an energy audit prepared in late 1979 for the school by Dynamic Integrations, Inc. of Fairlee Several other recommendations made by D.I.I. which involved little or no cost to the Town such as adjusting thermostats, closing dampers and changing building useage patterns have already been effected by our staff. Taken together these conservation measures should yield significant savings to the Town and the Board hopes that they will receive your support.

The energy audit suggested that a windbreak of trees be planted to the NNW of the school building to cut the heat loss due to winds. The audit goes on to say that: 'Studies have shown that by the time the trees reach the height of the building as much as 10% of heating energy can be saved per year.' It is our hope that a volunteer effort can be organized to plant a windbreak similar to the volunteer program that built our playground.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION REPORT

We are fortunate to have an active Adult Basic Education program in this area. It serves adults (16 and over) not currently enrolled in school and lacking a high school diploma. This self-help service is versatile, designing each individual program to suit the needs and wants of the student. It ties in basic literacy and math skills with such practical interest areas as child care, home repair, budgeting, car maintenance, filling out forms and applications, getting a driver's permit, and getting a high school equivalency diploma (G.E.D). Besides acquiring important information, the adult student has control over what he learns and how he learns it, in the process acquiring self-confidence and independence.

Students may be served in three ways: A B.E.'s correspondence course is geared toward the at-home student with good reading and math skills whose goal is the G.E.D.

The Barre Learning Center operates full time, with tutors available for adults at all levels who set up their own programs and hours.

A.B.E. home tutors serve adults who need individual attention and are unable to attend activities at the Barre Learning Center. This is especially helpful for individuals who are laid up, cannot drive, have small children, or work during business hours.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THETFORD ACADEMY

Thetford Academy is deeply rooted in the communities it has served for 162 years. The school and the towns grew up together. Both have changed over the years, but the Academy has always sought to meet the educational needs of the towns surrounding it, and the townspeople have counted it one of their basic institutions. This is particularly true of Thetford, but the histories of Strafford, Lyme, Fairlee, Vershire and West Fairlee are also interwoven with the Academy, and all the towns have families who can boast generations of Academy graduates. This partly explains the one thousand people who gathered last June to applaud the graduation of the 58 members of the Class of 1980, the four to one vote last spring reaffirming Thetford's designation of the Academy as the town's high school, the enthusiastic support of the Building Fund Auction, and the response of townspeople and Alumni to the First Annual Fund drive. It also explains the townspeople's concern with quality and standards at the Academy in addition to their natural concern for the part of the Academy's cost borne by the tuition charge.

In the past four years under the leadership of Roderick Maclay of Strafford the Trustees have reorganized themselves and sought closer communication with townspeople concerned for education. School Directors of each designating town were invited to nominate one member for election as a trustee. The Executive Committee of the board was expanded to seven members and one place reserved for a Trustee from each town. At least one public meeting of the Executive Committee is held each month. Dr. Matthew Wiencke of Thetford, who was elected President of the Board this fall, has arranged to have the regular meetings held in the designating towns on a rotating schedule, and he has also proposed an expansion of the working committees of the Board to include advisory members of interested townspeople. The Trustees are convinced that with the continued nurture of the community the Academy can not only live, but can flourish, strong and responsive to its environment, through its second century.

The generosity of Sheldon Miller's bequest, available in 1995, greatly reduces our schedule for retiring the building debt. The auction and Annual Fund Drive have made it possible to reduce interest costs for 1981-1982. Again this year our actual operating budget increase has been held below the inflation rate and the Tuition increase is only 7%. We have invested in fuel saving equipment and have budgeted for more energy saving in the coming year to reduce our utility expenses. Although reduction of the operation deficit has not been included in the budget for next year, we do plan to reduce the deficit gradually each year.

We opened in late August with 273 students registered from the following towns: Thetford 191, Strafford 16, West Fairlee 25, Vershire 20, Lyme 11, Fairlee 9, and Norwich 1. Mr. William Pond, a former Peace Corpsman and an experienced teacher, joined the faculty to teach Agriculture and Forestry.

We were able to host visiting teams for games on the renovated Peters Field this fall. Our teams have done well again this year in League and Statewide competition with the Girls' Basketball team bringing home the Class M Runner-up Banner.




POPULATION AND SCHOOL ENROLLMENT COMPARATIVE 1976 - 1980

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL TOWN AND SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MARCH 4, 1980

Meeting called to order at 10:05 A.M. on Tuesday, March 4, 1980, by the Moderator, Matthew I. Wiencke. After the Thetford Boy Scouts presented the American and State flags, Reverend Jeffrey Evans gave the opening prayer. The meeting paused for a moment of silence in memory of Edward LaMontagne. Ed LaMontagne was one of Thetford's prominent citizens who was active in civic, community, and church affairs for many years. His enthusiasm, wisdom and humor will be missed.

The Moderator declared the polls open for balloting on Article I until 7 P.M.

Article II Motion made that the Town accept the reports of the Officers of the Town of Thetford. The motion was seconded and passed by unanimous voice vote, there being no discussion.

Article III Motion made to accept Part I of the Budget Committee Report in regard to recommended expenditures for anticipated Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$34,887.33. The motion was seconded and after a brief question and answer discussion, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article IV Motion made to accept Part II of the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$122,647.00 for the Highway Budget and \$51,227.40 for the Town General Account. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on/or before October 22, 1980 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty. The motion was seconded. After a discussion lasting 30 minutes, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article V Motion made to accept Part III of the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$840,863.34 for the School District. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on/or before October 22, 1980 with interest of 1% thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty. The motion was seconded. After a lengthy discussion, during which Laurence Babcock, School Board Director, and Frederick Torrey, Headmaster of Thetford Academy, explained their budget requests and expenditures, a ballot vote was requested. The Moderator declared that voting on Article V would be by written ballot.

The Moderator called a recess for lunch at 12:05, and announced that the meeting would be resumed shortly after 1 P. M.

The number of paper ballots cast was 192. Favor - 96 Against - 96. The motion was made to reconsider Article V. Seconded. Motion made to call the question. After some discussion, this motion was withdrawn to allow debate to continue. A ballot vote was requested by the required three people. The number of paper ballots cast was 175. Favor - 65 Against - 109 Spoiled - 1. As a result of the original tie vote and the negative vote to reconsider, another Town Meeting will be scheduled to further discuss and vote on Article V.

Article VI Motion made that the Town appropriate \$1,676.40 to Orange County Mental Health Service, Inc. at \$1.65 per registered voter. The motion was seconded. Jane Bartrum gave a brief explanation of the services offered by OCMHS. There being no discussion, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article VII Motion made that the Town appropriate \$2,844.00 to Community Health Services, Inc. at \$2.00 per capita. The motion was seconded. Molly Shumate summarized the benefits Community Health Services offers the Town. There being no discussion, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article VIII Motion made that the Town appropriate \$5,200.00 to the Thetford Library Federation (Their request was for \$8,000.00 or \$4.00 per capita. \$2,800.00 was recommended to be appropriated from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds as in 1976-1979). The motion was seconded and passed by unanimous voice vote, there being no discussion.

Article IX Motion made that the Town appropriate \$500.00 for the White River Council on Aging. Seconded. Linda Glasgo gave an explanation of this organization and commended Bertha Brown for her contribution of time and effort as the Town's representative. There being no discussion, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article X Motion made that the Town appropriate \$1,000.00 to the F.A.S.T. Squad for equipment. The motion was seconded. Elmer Brown addressed the need for more equipment and supplies for the F.A.S.T. Squad. There being no discussion, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article XI Motion made that the Town appropriate \$1,500.00 to the Thetford Volunteer Fire Dept. for boots and radios. The motion was seconded and passed by unanimous voice vote, there being no discussion.

Article XII Motion made that the Town renew tax stabilization for the Rices Mills Community Assn., Inc. at \$30.00 for five years. Seconded. Daniel Ingold is leasing the building for the purpose of setting up an Energy Education Resource Center, funded through the State Energy Office and the Dept. of Energy. There will be a library there and a walk-in or call-in service. It will open in April or May, the hours to be announced. There being no discussion, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article XIII By Petition. Motion made to see if the voters wish to discontinue the east end of Town Road 17 that dead ends at I-91, and deed same to the abutting land owners. One half to each. Seconded. The Moderator inquired if there were any objections to Edward Thorburn speaking to this meeting on this issue as he is a legal resident of Norwich, but whose property abuts Town Road 17. There were no objections by Samuel Farnham, who was responsible for placing this article on the warning, or anyone else present. Three voters requested a ballot vote. The Moderator declared that voting on Article XIII would be by written ballot. The number of paper ballots cast was 151. Favor - 26. Against - 125. The Moderator declared that the motion on Article XIII had been defeated.

Article XIV By Petition. Motion made to see if the voters wish to ban the mining and milling of uranium within the borders of the Town of Thetford. Seconded. During the discussion which followed the question arose as to whether or not this article would be enforceable. Several people present voiced concern regarding this motion. The motion was carried in the affirmative by unanimous voice vote.

Article XV The following resolution was offered by Gary Wait: Moved to recommend to the Board of Civil Authority to invalidate the section of the Town Ballot pertaining to the election of selectman: to submit a new ballot for that office at the special Town Meeting and further that the incumbent continue in that office until said election. Seconded. The motion was carried in the affirmative by unanimous voice vote.

The following resolution was made by Howard Knight. Motion made to see if the voters wish to ban the use, transport and/or sale of any chemical containing Dioxin (better known as "agent orange") within the borders of the Town of Thetford and that our officials at local, county, state and federal levels be advised that it is illegal to do so. Seconded. There being no further discussion, the motion was carried in the affirmative by unanimous voice vote.

The following resolution was made by Ilse Winters. Moved that the Town take into consideration for next year, the holding of a pre-Town Meeting. Seconded. There being no discussion, the motion was carried in the affirmative by unanimous voice vote.

The Moderator mentioned that there was no second microphone because of the expense involved in renting one.

An advisory motion was made by Lynn Irwin that the School Board pay particular attention to the amounts of monies in the bus budget and the interest payment for the Academy. Seconded. Motion made to amend the motion to read that the School Board review the entire school budget. Seconded. The motion to amend was voted in the affirmative by voice vote. There being no further discussion, the original motion with the amendment was carried in the affirmative by unanimous voice vote.

It was reported that the speeding device which was authorized by the 1979 Town Meeting is being used and with good results.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting come to a close by a simple adjournment. Motion carried. The Meeting adjourned at 3:53 P.M.

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MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL TOWN AND SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MAY 12, 1980

Meeting called to order at 7:40 P.M. on Monday, May 12, 1980, by the Moderator, Matthew I. Wiencke. Reverend Jeffrey Evans gave the opening prayer. The Moderator stated that each person who wished to speak to an Article would be limited to one point to allow as many people as possible to speak and that dialogue would be discouraged. Two informational meetings have been held previous to the Special Town Meeting in which to air public opinion so that the purpose now was to deliberate upon the Articles at hand in a reasonable amount of time.

George Stowell, Chairman of the Selectmen, made the following two announcements. The first regarding tax maps which are now at the Town Clerk's Office and it would be helpful if property owners would stop by to view them and make any corrections. Secondly, the tax rate for 1980 has been estimated at \$3.56 per 100, which is an increase of 23% over 1979. If the Town Meeting elects not to levy an inventory tax, this will slightly increase the tax rate, as it would mean a loss of about seven thousand dollars in taxes. According to V.S.A., this would not take effect until the next tax year.

Article I By Petition. Motion made that the Town revoke the designation of Thetford Academy as the town high school. The motion was seconded. Mr. Robert Conrad, one of the signers of the petition, spoke to the reasons for bringing this article before the town. He urged voters to vote yes and then to introduce another article designating the academy with an open option for students wishing to attend other schools. Loren Mason also spoke to the benefits of freedom of choice for students.

Mr. Mason moved that Article I be amended to read that the Town revoke the designation of Thetford Academy as the town high school and to redesignate it on the condition that children may be enrolled in another state approved school with tuition supplied by the Town of Thetford up to the amount which otherwise would be paid to Thetford Academy. The chair ruled that this amendment not be allowed as it confused the issue at hand and only the original Article could be voted on as warned. The Moderator also stated that the amendment would not be legal according to the state law which specifies that posted notification shall be by separate article specifically indicating that this is to be transacted. Therefore, as the amendment introduces a stipulation that has not been warned, discussion on the amendment will be allowed but will not be voted upon at this meeting. Mr. Mason moved that the meeting vote to overrule the Moderator's ruling. Motion was seconded. The motion to overrule was not debatable. The motion was lost by unanimous voice vote.

During the discussion which followed to Article I, Elmer Brown, George Phelps, and William Lingelbach spoke in favor of designation. The question was called and seconded. After a unanimous voice vote, debate on Article I was closed. A ballot vote was requested by the required three people. The number of paper ballots cast was 414. Favor - 86. Against - 326. Spoiled - 2. The motion was lost.

Article II Motion made to hear and act upon the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$807,360.05 for the school district. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 22, 1980 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty. The motion was seconded. George Phelps, Chairman of the Budget Committee, stated that this amount reflected a \$33,503.29 reduction of the previous amount of \$840,863.34. Laurence Babcock, Chairman of the School Board, in response to questions asked, stated that the Meeting may only vote one sum of money to be spent as the Board sees fit and since Thetford Academy has now been officially designated as the Town's public high school, the tuition must be paid by the Town. Bernard Benn moved to amend Article II to read that the Town of Thetford will vote to approve a budget of \$423,303.00 plus the amount equal to the state average tuition in lieu of the original budget. The motion to amend was seconded. Mr. Benn withdrew his amendment after he learned from Mr. Babcock that since the Thetford Academy tuition would be paid first, the remaining amount would not be sufficient to operate the elementary school, therefore, the purpose of his amendment would be defeated.

There being no further discussion on Article II, the motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article III By Petition. Motion made that the voters approve the re-structure of the Budget Committee to a Board consisting of five (5) elected members with the Town Treasurer, Chairman of the Selectmen and the Chairman of the School Board serving in an advisory capacity. If approved, the present elected members shall serve out their current terms and two (2) new members shall be nominated from the floor of the meeting - one for a term of one year and the second member for a term of two years. Thereafter, beginning at the Annual Town Meeting in 1981, two members shall be elected annually by Australian Ballot - one for a term of two years and one for a term of three years. The motion was seconded. Robert Crossett moved to amend the motion to read "nominated and elected" from the floor of this meeting. Motion to amend was seconded. There being no discussion. the motion was passed by a unanimous hand vote. Mr. Crossett explained that the intent of the Petition was to offer the townspeople a chance of more participation in the budget making process. The Moderator asked for a show of hands after an undecided voice vote. The motion was carried by a unanimous hand vote. Nominations accepted from the floor for the two positions were Bernard Godfrey, Lynn Irwin, Donald Havens, Gus Jaccaci, Ralph Easton, and Bernard Benn. The nominations were closed. The voters were directed to vote for two of the six nominees on separate ballots. Bernard Godfrey received 75 votes, Lynn Irwin, 52; Donald Havens, 83; Gus Jaccaci, 29; Ralph Easton, 26; and Benn, 34. The chair declared that the nominee with the highest number of votes, Donald Havens, serve for two years and the runner-up, Bernard Godfrey, for the term of one year.

Article IV By Petition. Motion made that the Town elect not to tax inventory (stock in trade) provided for in 32 VSA 3617. (Excerpt from VSA 3802 (14) "As used in this sub-division, "inventory" means tangible personal property of a non-depreciable nature held for consumption, sale, resale, leasing, or to be furnished under contracts of service, in a trade or business, and includes without limitation, raw materials, work in process, semi-finished or finished goods of manufacturers and processors, and the stock-in-trade of wholesalers and retailers.") The motion was seconded. Several Thetford businessmen spoke in favor of this motion including Robert Atkins, Elmer Brown, Gary Ulman, and William Pugh. George Stowell, Chairman of the Selectmen, again stated that the loss to the Town would be approximately \$7,000.00 or an increase of 2½ cents on the tax rate. There being no further discussion, the motion was carried by a unanimous voice vote.

Article V Motion made to adjourn the meeting. Second and Carried. Whereupon, after the disposition of said business, said meeting shall be adjourned to the following day, May 13, 1980, for balloting by Australian Ballot on the following article. The polls for said ballot shall be at the Town Hall, Thetford Center, Vermont, and shall be open from 10 A.M. until 7 P.M.

Article VI To elect a Selectman for a three year trm.

THETFORD VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Thetford Volunteer Fire Department responded to 68 alarms as follows: Chimney — 19; Mutual Aid — 16; Grass/Brush — 13; Automobile — 11; Structure — 5; Public Service — 2; Smoke Investigation — 1; Aircraft — 1.

Our out-of-town Mutual Aid calls were: Norwich, 3; West Fairlee, 1; Strafford, 5; Lyme, 4; Fairlee, 1; Vershire, 2. These towns provided aid and coverage at our structural fires. This mutual aid provides us with trained manpower and equipment to deal with serious fires.

In an effort to reduce the amount spent to heat the two fire stations, both were insulated and a wood burning furnace has been installed at Thetford Hill.

The training tower has been constructed and is used for ladder and air-pack drills. A new floor was made at the Post Mills station.

Drills are conducted monthly to provide training of fire fighters to insure that they will make efficient use of our equipment. Work details were also conducted to raise funds to help meet the increased expenses.

I would like to thank the people of Thetford for their continued care in preventing fires and their support of their Fire Department.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Thirty-five permits were given. There were two fires last summer; one caused by a cigarette and the other by lightning. A total of about 3 acres of land was damaged.

What is a Good Incinerator?

An oil drum with the top removed and two or three holes drilled in the bottom to let rain water drain out. Better burning will result if a few holes are made around the barrel six inches or so up from the bottom and it is raised an inch or two off the ground. It should have a cover of 1/2 or 1/4 inch mesh hardware cloth cut slightly larger than the size of the drum so the edges may be bent down to hold it in place.

Where Should it be Placed?

In a bare spot away from buildings (50 feet is a safe distance). A bare spot is not entirely necessary when the grass and weeds are green. When the vegetation is dry and no bare spot is available, use the burner only when it is raining or there is snow on the ground.

What Should it be fed?

Do not place material in your trash burner until you are ready to set it on fire. If left unburned, it will get soggy. Feed it frequently with small amounts. If you cram the barrel full, it will sit there and smolder instead of burning quickly and cleanly.

What else should be done?

Empty the ashes occasionally. Your barrel will last longer if you do.

When is an Incinerator legal for Burning?

After it has been approved by your Fire Warden, and as long as it is kept in the SAME CONDITION AS WHEN IT WAS APPROVED.

Exception: If you live in an incorporated village with a fire department, see your fire chief.

During such times as the Governor forbids outdoor fires, do not use your incinerator.

NOTE: In spite of what any salesman may tell you, no trash burner or incinerator is "official" or "approved" until declared so by the *Fire Warden*.

Rubbish fires from faulty incinerators cause 20% of Vermont's forest fires. USE YOUR INCINERATOR PROPERLY.

VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH Annual Report to the Citizens of Thetford

The established mission of the State Health Department is to protect and promote the health of all Vermonters. In working towards this goal, the Vermont Department of Health has provided directly, or assured the provision of, preventive health services to communities across the state. During 1980, the following services were received by the residents of Thetford:

245 elementary school children were examined by a dental hygienist and received personal oral hygiene instruction twice during the school year.

The Dental Program monitored the fluoridation equipment of the Thetford Elementary School.

3 persons received services through the Maternal and Child Health Program.

75 comprehensive health assessments including preventive health guidance were provided at Well Child Conferences.

110 persons received nutrition education and food supplements through the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).

45 children underwent medical evaluation and treatment through the Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment Program (EPSDT).

Through the Handicapped Children Program, diagnosis and treatment services for orthopedic, hearing, cardiac, and other conditions were provided to 8 children.

Through the Child Development Clinic, 2 children received diagnostic and intensive follow-up services for suspected developmental disorders.

154 immunizations were given in Health Department clinics.

5 persons received screening for early detection of lung disease through the Barre. Rutland, or other Health Department chest clinics.

The following services were provided by the Health Department Laboratory in Burlington:

- 12 blood tests to identify women needing immunization against german measles (rubella) to prevent birth defects,
- 47 other diagnostic blood tests,
- 41 bacteriological and viral cultures,
- 150 tests of individual and municipal water systems to monitor drinking water quality.

Statewide, 259 emergency medical technicians were trained, 286 were recertified and 305 received advanced training; 195,507 doses of vaccine were supplied to private physicians, school nurses, and other health providers; 17 hospitals and 46 nursing homes were inspected and licensed; 3,804 restaurants were inspected; 3,655 venereal disease office visits and/or treatments were paid for and 1,063 contacts were traced; material to test 14,270 persons for tuberculosis was distributed to private physicians,

TOWN HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

The four water companies in town continue to send water samples for state testing and are meeting state standards.

Individuals may have their well or spring water supplies tested for bacteriological contamination by obtaining a water sample bottle either from the Town Clerk's Office or the Health Officer. Over fifty requests for these tests were handled this year. In some cases, chemical analysis of water supplies was also done.

Hazardous waste disposal and contamination of ground water supplies is a growing public concern. The Thetford Board of Health and State Health Officials have been working with Thetford residents in answering questions and working toward satisfactory testing and monitoring programs.

Two foster home inspections were conducted this year.

Assistance was provided in correcting many failed sewage systems and contaminated water supplies in Town.

Many tenant complaints were received this year concerning the lack of water supplies, hot water, proper sewage disposal, etc. Landlords must be sure that any rented unit meets the minimum State requirements, as a rental unit is considered a public building.

WHITE RIVER COUNCIL ON AGING

Individuals took advantage of informational and recreational programs, received the monthly informational newsletter which includes activities of Thetford Friends Together, requested information on the discount card program, received assistance with individual concerns and used the new transportation system. Presently, older residents are transported the second Friday and the fourth Tuesday of each month to shopping and to the center.

The White River Council on Aging, the non-profit organization which operates the center, is pleased to serve the Thetford community at our new location in the T. D. Bugbee Building at Route 5 and North Main in White River Junction. This new facility includes the following:

Multi-purpose Room

For: Active games, parties, meetings, seated dinners, community service projects, bazaars, dances, musical groups, etc.

Small Meeting Area

For: Cards and games, discussion groups, meetings, study groups, writing, craft sales, carnivals, etc.

Crafts Room

For: Hobbies, crafts, needlework, rug and quilt making, gift shop, etc.

Modern Kitchen

For: Noon dinners, home delivered meals, community dinners.

Pool table and game area

Quiet Lounges / Resource Library

For: Reading, writing, relaxing, visiting

Outdoor space

For: Space for picnic tables, horseshoes, lawn chairs, etc.

The center is open 8:30-4:30 Monday through Friday and is operated by staff of the White River Council on Aging and numerous volunteers. Services are funded by United Way of the Upper Valley, town allocations, individual contributions and the Council on Aging for Southeastern Vermont.

THETFORD TOWN - LATHAM MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Thetford Town - Latham Memorial Library, a member of the Library Federation, added over 500 books to its collection. Some of these were purchased with Library funds, some with a Grant from the State Department of Libraries, and some from individual gifts. This brings the total to 11,027. We also added 11 new magazine subscriptions, and for professional use Wilson's Children's Catalog. As in the past, the Library borrowed some 200 books from the Regional Library in St. Johnsbury four times a year for a three month period, and participated in the Inter-library Loan System.

The Library fulfilled Step I required by the State and received a grant for \$560. With part of this, Large Type Books were purchased.



THETFORD LIBRARY FEDERATION

During the year we have worked out a policy for the use of our basement room by outside groups. We bought 25 folding chairs for this room and a movie projector, and ran a series of films during the winter. We are continuing to work hard to hold down the cost of operating our building, and have succeeded in reducing the use of both oil and electricity.

In the field of library cooperation, regular meetings of member librarians have been reinstituted. In addition to the film program, this group, under Marian Fifield's leadership, has instituted a community calendar which has been installed in three villages. Federation President Susan Voake is serving on a task force on library cooperation set up by the State Librarian.

Funds given by the town give us just enough to operate our building and to make modest grants to Peabody and Latham Libraries. To finance further activities, and to make a start on building up an endowment, we run a yearly fund-raising campaign beginning each August. In 1979-1980, 112 donors gave a total of \$5,943. So far since August 1980, 64 donors have given a total of about \$1,900. In addition, 55 donors gave a total of \$827 as a memorial to Betty Nye.

Last spring a memorial plaque was set up in our lobby to recognize the work of Richard Fowle, who gave us the land for our building and left a trust which enabled us to pay off the last of our building loan and to start an endowment. This year we have formed an investment committee to handle these funds. A separate treasurer's report will be submitted.

THETFORD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Our regular program has gone on as usual, with two well-attended winter meetings, and an annual meeting in August which this year featured a members' show-and-tell. In addition we put on an exhibition in July for Thetford Center's Old Home Day and another in August for the Thetford Hill Fair.

Our historical library was open two days a week during the summer and served many clients, particularly those interested in tracing family history. Louise Vaughan answers genealogical inquiries by mail regularly through the year, and also opens the library upon request. During the year the librarian and curator and their helpers have reorganized the archives, nearly completing the classification of Mary B. Slade's papers, organizing the papers of Camp Hanoum and the First Congregational Church, building a large rack to hold framed pictures, and processing many pamphlets onto the shelves. Cataloging of the book collection is now complete.

Our barn museum was put in shape for an August opening by Charles and Fannie Hughes. We are working on plans for an extension of the barn, and hope to be able to move on this soon.

Through a gift of Maurice Bond, we have been able to purchase a cassette recorder, and hope shortly to transfer the recordings which we already have, and to build up a cassette library of oral history.

THE NOOSUC MILL THETFORD'S STRAWBOARD FACTORY

Workmen repairing or dismantling old houses in the Thetford area have occasionally found that the outside boards were covered with rectangles of a rather thick, tough, yellowish paper, showing that our predecessors were quite ready to use an available insulating material to keep the heat in and the winter winds out of their houses. This strawboard was formerly made in Thetford Center at a site on the Pompanoosuc about a half mile below the covered bridge.

The Noosuc Mill, as it was called, was on the old road from Thetford Center to Union Village. After descending "Tavern Hill", one came to a house on the right then occupied by Lorenzo Willoughby (generally called "Ren") and then to two houses belonging with the mill and usually occupied by people connected with it. S. G. Rogers, the owner and operator of the mill, lived in the second of these houses in 1858. There was a great barn in which rye straw and waste paper were stored. The mill itself was located on the nearer bank of the Pompanoosuc River. From the point of view of water power this does not appear to be a very good location, — the fall has been estimated as ten feet compared with forty-five feet at the falls immediately below the covered bridge, but we know of no difficulties due to this factor.

The earliest paper mills in Vermont date from the last decade of the eighteenth century. The usual material for early handmade paper was linen rags. The paper maker placed a frame called a deckle on a mold made of fine wires and dipped it into a vat containing a mixture of water and linen rags reduced to a pulp by pounding. The thin layer thus gathered when evened, drained, and pressed became a single sheet of paper. Later a moving belt was used, gathering an endless web of pulp which lost moisture and became more compact as it passed through the mill.

Paper made from linen was unsurpassed for writing paper or for books, but other materials were tested. The early mill at Fair Haven, Vermont made paper from basswood bark. It had long been known that paper could be made from straw, indeed this had been done as early as 1765 in Europe. In our own country a mill near Chambersburg, Pennsylvania had made paper from straw in 1829.

The Noosuc Mill used a mixture of chopped straw and waste paper, the latter collected by peddlers who exchanged tinware for old paper or rags. In this connection it is interesting to note that William T. Morse of Union Village was listed as a farmer and tin peddler as late as 1888. The operation was of the continuous type, but the paper evidently was not sold as a roll but was cut into rectangles. One surviving piece measures twenty-two by thirty-one and a half inches.

At first, these sheets were simply spread out on the grass to dry, but the Vermont climate being what it is, this could only be done in the warmer part of the year. Later, what a deed calls a "patent dryer" was installed, and this made deliveries, hitherto restricted to the summer, possible throughout the year. Evidently this improvement gave the Thetford mill an advantage over some of its competitors. We do not know what particular patent was involved, but the basic procedure was to pass the paper stock between heated rollers. Six trips a year were made to Boston and Springfield and in the spring strawboard brought as much as \$125 a ton. The mill also made binder's board for book covers and in later years coarse brown wrapping paper.

The Thetford strawboard mill dates from 1848 when Stephen G. Rogers came to Thetford from Plymouth, New Hampshire. He built the mill and operated it until about 1866 when he constructed and operated a woolen mill farther down stream. Child's Orange County Gazetteer states that Horace E. Brown "engaged in the manufacture of strawboard in company with S. M. Gleason and J. B. Cram" from 1865 to about 1870. Born in Thetford, Brown had a difficult childhood and later worked in various places as a mason and then as a contractor before returning to Thetford in 1861. After serving in the Civil War with the rank of captain, he managed the strawboard mill and later established a shoe factory. Gleason was a lawyer and later a probate judge who lived at the junction of the old Union Village road with what is now Route 113. Cram, who had previously been a storekeeper in East Pembroke, New Hampshire, moved in 1869 or 1870 to the old tavern on the opposite corner which then became "Cram's Hotel." His daughter, Helen L. Cram states that he had a fine tenor voice, led the choir in the Timothy Frost Methodist Church, and taught singing schools in the vicinity. The dates in the Orange County Gazetteer are not accurate. The earliest record of the firm appears to be Sept. 21, 1866. It is also clear that both Cram and Gleason had an interest in the property after 1870.

The last operators of the strawboard mill were W. J. and H. M. Lovejoy who acquired an interest in the mill in 1872. Their tenure was destined to be brief for the mill was destroyed by fire before 1875. An article in the Bradford Opinion estimates the loss as eight to ten thousand dollars of which only five thousand four hundred dollars was covered by insurance. A later entry announces that "the Lovejoys of Thetford Center have removed to Northfield and leased a mill there Jan. 1, 1875. They are known as the best strawboard makers in New England." This was the end of strawboard manufacture in Thetford.



The library is open three times a week, Monday and Saturday afternoons from one until four, and on Thursday evenings from six until nine. The library may be used on other occasions by appointment.

The Library Association is a nonprofit organization and invites its members, and members of the community to aid in fund-raising activities. For this cooperation we extend our heartfelt thanks.

The collection of books includes adult and juvenile fiction and nonfiction. These are found on the upper level of the building. An Early Developmental Program for pre-school children, conducted by Orange East Supervisory Union, is held on the lower level. This room is available for meetings, receptions and activities of a civic or social nature.

Richard Wallace Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution hold meetings at the library on the first Tuesday of each month, May through October.

LADIES' BENEFIT SOCIETY, POST MILLS

The Ladies' Benefit Society is a non-denominational woman's group, meeting on the third Thursday of the month at the Parish House on Route 244 in Post Mills. Fund raising activities of rummage sale, Strawberry Festival, summer sale and Christmas Silver Tea raise monies for the Thetford Fire Dept., the Thetford F.A.S.T. Squad, Post Mills Church, the Peabody and West Fairlee Elementary School libraries and a scholarship each year for a Thetford Academy graduate. All area women are cordially invited to attend our meetings and work on our projects.

THETFORD CENTER FELLOWSHIP OF WOMEN

The Center Group meets the first Monday of every month, with the exception of August, in the Old School House in the Village. The Group aids in the support and preservation of the Timothy Frost Methodist Church by helping to pay the minister's salary and to have the clock wound. To be of assistance to other community services, we hold bake sales, sew for Old Home Day, and have a variety of other fund raising events.

All women residing in Thetford Center are eligible for membership and are invited to attend any meeting. There is a membership fee of .25¢ and regular dues of .25¢ paid at the annual meeting.

NORTH THETFORD LADIES AID

The Ladies Aid holds meetings at the North Thetford Federated Church on the second Tuesday of each month at 2:00 P.M., except January, July and August. Fund raising activities include a Summer Sale and Supper, and the sale of certain household items.

Their budget provides for aid and support to the North Thetford Federated Church and its parsonage; donations to community organizations and activities; state, national and international causes and missions; the North Thetford Library; and the maintenance of an Educational Aid Fund.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

The United Methodist Women's group of the Union Village church is small, but very active. It is mainly through the efforts of this small group that the church doors remain open. With the able help of the Men's group, Union Village and the surrounding countryside still have a church, and everyone is welcome. One novelty of this church is that the church and all church properties, are entirely owned by Pew Owners, and not by the Methodist Conference.

MEN'S GOODFELLOWSHIP

The Men's Goodfellowship group of Union Village is still small, but hard working. Along with the Women's group, we share the work raising all necessary funds for the church. In 1980 the necessary funds were raised to have the parsonage covered with vinyl siding.

ECLIPSE GRANGE No. 255

Eclipse Grange extends a welcome to anyone from 13½ years of age and over, to join the Grange. Our 1980 Citizens Award for the year went to the Thetford Volunteer Fire Dept. We have also given many hand knitted lap robes to the convalescent unit of the Alice Peck Day Hospital, and to the B-4 Community Care Home of Wilder. These are just a few of the things that the Grange does.

THETFORD LIONS CLUB

During 1980, the Thetford Lions continued their proud tradition of service to the community with funds raised from an Auction, Bar-b-que dinner, Horse Show, and our newest project - a Fair conducted with the Bradford Lions Club at Gray's Field in Fairlee.

The support of these projects from the people in our service area have made the following possible: Contributions to two nursery schools; Fall Foliage tour for Senior Citizens; Sent two local youths to state conservation camp; Provided three scholarships to college bound students; assisted students in funding their trip to Europe; and Continued sponsorship of the local Boy Scout troop.

Sight conservation is the main interest of Lions and our club provided funds to needy residents for glasses and examinations.

All of the funds for these services are raised by the members from you and we thank you for making it possible. The Lions Club is looking for more men in the area with an interest in providing a needed community service. If you want information about the Lions Club, please contact any member.

THETFORD GIRL SCOUTS

The Thetford Girl Scouts are having a busy and productive year

BOY SCOUTS REPORT


UPPER VALLEY FISH & GAME CLUB, INC.

THETFORD RESIDENTS AND PROPERTY OWNERS INFORMATION

DOGS

All dogs six months of age and older must be licensed between January 1st and April 1st of each year. Before licensing the dog must have a rabies shot and a certificate on file in the Town Clerk's Office. Rabies shots are good for 24 months if the dog is over 2 years of age and for 12 months until the dog reaches the age of 2 years.

FEES: Neutered Male & Spayed Female \$4.00 Male \$6.00 Female \$8.00 FEES after April 1st

Neutered Male and Spayed Female \$6.00 Male \$9.00 Female \$12.00

Dogs that move into Town after April 1st, or are licensed within 90 days of arrival, owners pay the regular fee. After 90 days they are liable for the late fees. Please report all deceased dogs to the Town Clerk's Office. Licenses may be obtained by mail.

"The owner or keeper of 3 or more dogs, four months of age or older, kept for sale or breeding purposes . . . shall apply to the Town Clerk for a kennel permit . . . Kennel permit expires March 31." 20 VSA 3681

PROPERTY TAX BILLS

Bills will be mailed out July 21, 1981 and are payable on that date. You have a 90 day grace period, ending October 21, 1981.

PAYMENTS OF TAX BILLS

All payments received in the hands of the Treasurer after the final grace period date are delinquent, regardless of the date on the check or postmark, and will be turned over to the Tax Collector.

All delinquent taxes will have an 8% penalty and a five cents warrant fee added plus interest of 1% each month. These are added the day they become delinquent and charges are not pro-rated.

CHECKLISTS

Voter registration for elections and town meetings close at 12:00 o'clock noon the third Saturday prior to voting. Application forms may be obtained at the bank or Town Clerk's Office. Anyone wishing to vote must make application; you are not automatically placed on the checklist.

PERMITS NEEDED

Accesses from Highways

A written permit is required from the selectmen for any access from property to state aid roads and all town roads. Anyone building or wishing to drive to their property from these roads must obtain a permit.

Section 43: It shall be unlawful to develop, construct or regrade any driveway entrance or approach, or build a fence or building, or deposit material of any kind within, or in any way affect the grade of, a highway right of way, or obstruct a ditch, culvert, or drainage course that drains a highway, or fill or grade the land adjacent to a highway so as to divert the flow of water onto the highway right of way, without a written permit from the Board of Selectmen. (V.S.A. 19: 1-43 Act 460)

Zoning Permits

No building construction or land development may commence, or no land or structure may be devoted to a new or changed use within the Town without a Zoning Permit duly issued by the Zoning Administrator as provided for in Section 4443 of the Act. (Thetford Zoning Ordinance Article 8, Section 820) Any business use carried on within the home requires either a Home Occupation Permit or a Conditional Use approval by the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

On Site Sewage Disposal System

A person before constructing a sewage disposal system shall make application for a permit to construct, to the Local Board of Health, on the prescribed form, accompanied by an \$80.00 fee. A Sanitary Specialist will then inspect and test the proposed site, and give recommendations.

The Local Board of Health must issue a Construction Permit before any construction is done. The Sanitary Specialist is to be notified 48 hours in advance as to the date the system is to be installed, so that he can make an inspection during construction. After all requirements have been complied with, an Occupancy Permit will be issued.

Applications may be picked up and filed with the Town Clerk.

Sub-division

No sub-division of land may legally occur without a hearing before the Thetford Planning Commission. The placing of a second dwelling on a lot constitutes a sub-division (Thetford Sub-division Regulations, Section 2.42). Application forms and copies of the Thetford Sub-division Regulations are available at the Town Clerk's Office. Sometimes there can be confusion over the meaning of the Regulations. The Zoning and Sub-division Administrator and/or members of the Thetford Planning Commission will be glad to try to informally answer questions. A sub-divider is also welcome to come before the Planning Commission during one of its regularly scheduled meetings to ask questions. Meetings are held the first and fourth Tuesdays after the first Monday of the month, beginning at 7:30 PM in the Town Hall.

Flood Hazard Area Zoning By-Law

A comprehensive Flood Hazard Area Zoning By-Law was adopted by the Board of Selectmen on 31 July 1978. This By-Law regulates all new construction and development uses prescribed by the Thetford Zoning Ordinance, which fall within the federally-designated flood hazard areas, within 100 feet of these area boundaries, or within 100 feet from the centerline of any stream designated as a flood hazard area. Copies of the new By-Law may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office.
